Representatives from the apartment council and the households council, Lee Skaife and Tom Murray respectively, were present to summarize some of the highlights of their meetings. Lee brings items needing attention to staff and has been very satisfied with follow through, especially the cleaning of the pond and the front entrance to Attic Angel Place. Tom noted that residents were satisfied with activities and are now enjoying music during meals which is played via overhead speakers.

An energy subcommittee recommended that an energy audit be approved for all three corporations and as such, a motion was passed to take money from the capital budget for AAP to accomplish this.

Another motion was passed to install smoke doors on the second and third floors of the apartments and this money will also be taken from the current capital budget.

Construction of the expansion to AAP is on target and the wing should be totally enclosed in December. Pictures of the current construction can be found throughout the building.

The Resident Aid policy and the AAP Bylaws will be under review to insure they reflect current activities.

Claire Merkt, Marketing Director for the Community unveiled the new logo and narrative to tell our story with a clear and concise message. "Extraordinary Giving, Exceptional Living" will be our new tag line.

Mission Moments

One of the many things I've always appreciated about Attic Angel Community is how our mission is a tangible guidepost brought to life through our ongoing interactions, long range plans and policies. Continuing the review of how we bring our respective mission statements to life, I offer the following:

Attic Angel Association: ***Members meet health and human service needs through volunteer and financial support...***

There are such a multitude of community needs, it helps that our mission statement narrows it down to health and human service needs. That is why the Board invites speakers from United Way, Dane County Department of Health and Human Services, or the Madison Community Foundation to apprise the Board on the areas of greatest need, so an annual focus can be adopted, and our efforts coalesced around that specific topic. As you are aware, our focus for this year is "*Home Visits For At-Risk Children And Their Families To Prepare For Kindergarten.*" We don't have to look to the greater Dane County Community to identify other health and human service needs. Certainly the care we provide through the Attic Angel Place and Prairie Point options addresses the health and human service needs of our residents. We take a very holistic approach to those needs, so we can address all the spheres of human needs, which include: wellness, spiritual, social, medical and educational.

As far as providing volunteer and financial support to address these needs, the Attic Angels have collectively provided over 32,000 hours of time in the past year; and over 16,650 of that was Angel Care, or direct service to our residents. That is equivalent to 15.4 full time staff; or a conservative value of \$480,000. Not only did Angels give a great number of collective hours, 11 gave over 200 hours; an additional 2 gave over 300 hours; 2 more gave over 400 hours; 4 gave over 500 hours; and one had over 600 volunteer hours. In addition to the wonderful Angel volunteers, we also offer volunteer opportunities to our residents. We had 17 Prairie Point residents (who are NOT Angel members) who provided 717 hours of volunteer service to residents and serving on committees.

The financial support provided to the Association, Attic Angel Place, Resident Aid, Employee Appreciation and the Expansion Fund, from residents / staff / Angels / and other donors was a whopping \$693,998 this past year. Clearly Angels put their money, talents and time where their hearts and passions lie in the Attic Angel Community.

As you may know we have been struggling to meet both the needs of our staff and our customers when it comes to our PM Receptionists' breaks. We have been working on a solution that will resolve this situation. We have been carefully considering all of our options to be as respectful and considerate as possible of all parties involved. On September 9th you will notice a new staffing structure during the week at the front desk that will resolve this issue. There will be a second Receptionist available to cover the PM break. On weekends the Reception staff will cover its own breaks during the day and the Activity staff will cover breaks in the evening. We understand that this structure will help Residents feel more secure but again stress that the Receptionist job duties do not include providing security. Attic Angel has taken many steps to ensure the security of our building. These include our automatic locking doors, surveillance cameras, access limitation through proximity cards and JBM Security patrols. We hope the additional steps we have taken to provide coverage at the desk during all open hours will help customers to feel more comfortable in our environment as well. Angel Q&A

Q. Is it ok to use other entertainment besides those on the entertainment list on the web site?

A. ABSOLUTELY! We would love to see that list grow. If you know of individuals or groups who would like to share their talents and come in for any of the social events hosted by the Angels, by all means, invite them. You can even contact Joanne Salzmann and ask her to add their name to the list!

Q. I saw an Angel with a blue dot with a T on her name tag. What does that mean?

A. Up until a few years ago, Angels were trained to assist residents when they wanted to move from sitting in one place to another (bed to chair; chair to wheelchair; etc.), and they were given this sticker to indicate they had been trained. Because volunteers have no way of knowing a resident's ability to transfer on any given day, this training has been discontinued and, for the safety of our residents and volunteers, a policy was established that ONLY TRAINED STAFF will assist residents when transferring. This would include any seated surface including transferring from a chair, bed, wheelchair, bus or car seat or with a resident's walker. Also, for those residents requiring assistance walking from one area of the building to another, only trained staff will assist or they will help the resident transfer to a wheelchair and a volunteer can take them to where they are going.

- When bringing a resident back to the Health Center or Haven from an activity, always let staff know and they will give you direction. If a resident requests to be returned to their room, please put on the call light and wait until staff arrives.
- Occasionally, an alarm may sound. This could be for several reasons and it is always to alert staff of a resident safety situation. When this happens, please stay with the resident until staff has arrived.

We appreciate your desire to help our residents and there are many other ways you can support them. Since the condition of residents in All AREAS of the facility may change at any time, it is necessary that only staff, who have all the pertinent information and are trained, perform these services. Thank you for remembering this important information and for protecting the safety of our residents and yourself.

A New Addition with a Healthy Heart

The Attic Angel Place Expansion Project - News Flash #9

Our current capital campaign, aptly named “Enhancing the Circle of Care,” gives all of us an exciting opportunity to “pay it forward” to meet current and future needs of the Attic Angel continuum of care. Although I could show you all kinds of building plans and talk about the many special amenities in the new addition, it’s just as important to assure you that **the new addition will have a living, beating heart.** It’s the same heart that beats now at Attic Angel Place, but it will be an even **fuller heart** with an even **stronger beat** when the old and new buildings become one in Summer 2013. Our new and existing bricks and mortar will shape a new vessel to hold the **heartbeat** of our mission at Attic Angel Place.

We first heard **heart murmurs** in 2008-09 when a task force predicted future needs at Attic Angel Place. Since then, **recurrent “chest pains”** have re-confirmed the urgent need for all private rooms in the Health Center; for more assisted living units in our Households; for an enlarged

rehab space for the efficient, state-of-the-art delivery of physical, speech and occupational therapies; and for remodeled wellness, dining and activity spaces. In late 2010, we could wait no longer to treat our **“heart blockage”** – that blockage being the strain on care and services due to the limitations of our current space – and we began planning for the Attic Angel Place Expansion. As you know, in



October 2011 a 3-year capital campaign was launched to fund a portion of the building cost, and in May 2012, we broke ground on the new addition.

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
