Bob Zellers, Jennifer Schneider, and Erica Hill from M&I Wealth Management were introduced to the Board. Bob Zellers began the meeting with a synopsis of Attic Angel's investment portfolio, indicated we were on target with our investments and did very well this year, and answered questions. He also gave a presentation on the current financial environment, and feels we shouldn't have any trouble hitting our targets for this year.

We are in the fifth year of our Long Range Plan and most of our objectives have been met. Discussion was held on how to proceed with setting new goals for the next Long Range Plan.

Attic Angel has several non-Angel volunteers such as students and men and the subject has been referred to the Policy Committee to establish guidelines to govern these volunteers as they work with the residents.

The new Intern Class has added two new members, bringing the total to 18, and they will all be introduced at the annual meeting on April 28.

Barb Berven gave the 125th Anniversary Committee and Gala Committee updates. They are planning a number of yearlong activities which will culminate with the Gala October 18 at Monona Terrace. Barb mentioned that we are at 114 camperships, just 11 short of our goal of 125 and that they plan to extend the deadline in hopes that we can be successful. (Ed. note: The goal has been reached!)

Peg Jones was thanked for her help with the Past Chair duties and retiring Board Members Dale Wortley, Susan Kalin, Barbara McFarland, and Linda Wise were thanked for their much appreciated and dedicated service.

Big Changes

There are big changes afoot for AM Studio programming! Our new morning program will be a mobile art cart. Along with two Angel volunteers, I will visit one level of care a day and bring fun art activities to residents where they live. The **trial** format for May will look like this:

Studio Angels should check in at the front desk and meet me in the Studio at **9:30 AM.** We will take the Art Cart with supplies to our scheduled destination. I will set up the project and the two Angels will gather residents. At 10:00 AM I will lead the activity and we will all help residents complete the project. At 11:00 AM, Angels will help residents back to their rooms or to the dining room for lunch. AM Studio Art Cart will conclude at **11:30 AM.**

The only day that Angels and I will remain in the Studio for morning programming will be Tuesdays to help weavers on their looms. Residents are welcome to work *independently* in the Studio during the morning hours. For those in our Haven, I will continue to visit and do Art Cart on Monday afternoons. No Angels are required for Haven Art Cart. Each week, I will plan a new art activity so that every month residents are able to enjoy creating a variety of artwork.

For the past two years, the Studio has struggled to fill all four volunteer positions needed to operate the traditional AM Studio one-to-one program, so it was time to try something exciting and new. It is my goal to reach out to as many residents as possible. Creating art with neighbors can build friendships and introduce residents and Angels to new people.

AAP Board Highlights

The Board performed its annual review of its governing documents, concentrating this year on the policies of Attic Angel Place. Several minor changes were proposed and approved. The new business portion of the meeting focused on the operating and capital budgets. Funds have been allocated for strategic planning and management training. Therapy changes are being considered, as are a wellness coordinator, additional dining options and some point of service changes. Bond covenants are projected to be healthy as the expansion space fills up. Rate structures for the apartments will offer some new variety. The capital budget provided for some renovations throughout Attic Angel Place. Both the operating and capital budgets were approved. Derek Buckley provided updates on some changes within AAP, including the social hour and restaurant style dining being piloted in the Apartments. The new kitchen in the Health Center and the one in the new addition have started preparing breakfast to order. Plans are to provide the same service for the Households at some point in the future. Options are also being considered for the Café. The new nurse call system has been installed and is being tested and GPS will be installed on the AAP campus. The use of the Wellness Center is gradually expanding.

In Their Words

She had her credentials in order from MATC and the UW and so began a long and delectable career at Attic Angel Place. Sheila celebrates her 40th anniversary this year as Director of Food Services!

The support that employees receive from AAP for continuing education is a great benefit of working here, says Sheila. Not only has she been on the receiving end of continuing education, but has also taught as a member of her professional organization. She recalled the help and guidance she has received from volunteers who were retired dietitians on food service committees. She feels there is a "mutual respect between a caring staff and the work of the volunteer."

There has been a lot of change and growth over her 40-year tenure. She has been involved with the design of two kitchens, first at the Tower on Segoe Road, and of course, our newer current facility. Sheila has had offers of other jobs over the 40 years but has chosen to stay at Attic Angel Place. She feels strongly that "this is the best place, it feels like home." It "feels safe" here. She has seen generations of family come through AAP and feels they come back because they know they will be well cared for. Sheila could write a book about her tenure at Attic Angel Place with all the changes, events and lives that have passed her way!

Sheila implemented 'select a menu' and feels it is important for the residents to have choice in their lives. She gives it the personal touch when she can by providing a particular cereal or product she may not carry in stock for a resident. She enjoys speaking with residents and hopes her few minutes help make their day better. Sheila manages approximately 40 employees in food services from high school to senior citizens!

In closing Sheila stated, "I enjoy coming to work everyday because of the great staff that is very caring and support one another. There is always a variety of things to do so you are never bored. Attic Angel is continually growing and changing so you have to change your processes. We get through it because of such great teamwork. We couldn't do all we do here without the volunteers and staff working together."

A Transformational Legacy Gift

Dr. Edwin Michael Foster, fondly remembered by his many friends and colleagues as "Mike," planned for two major gifts to be given to Attic

Angel Association upon his death. When he passed away in 2013, Attic Angel Association received a beneficiary distribution from Dr. Foster's IRA, and in March 2014, a major gift from Dr. Foster's trust arrived. Dr. Foster's wife of 65 years, Winona, preceded him in death in 2006. Attic Angel Association is honored to announce that Mike and Winona Foster are the newest members of the McKenzie Circle within Attic Angel Legacy. The McKenzie Circle is the highest level of Legacy membership and is reserved for donors with cumulative gifts of \$500,000 and above.

Mike Foster grew up on a small cotton farm in East Texas during hard times. His mother encouraged him to go to college. He earned a master's degree in biology from North Texas State Teachers College and then completed a PhD in bacteriology at the University of Wisconsin in 1941.

During World War II, he served in the Chemical Warfare Service at Camp Detrick, Maryland. After the war, his UW career began with an assistant professorship in agricultural bacteriology, and his work at UW continued for 42 years. His tenure included leadership of the Food Research Institute, which grew in scope and size with Dr. Foster at the helm. He received numerous awards and honors from both governmental and private organizations. Mike's humble Texas roots remained with him throughout his life. He told many wonderful stories about growing up on the family's cotton farm, and he always expressed his gratitude for having had the opportunity to attend college and earn the advanced degree that launched his long and fulfilling career.

Winona Foster was a member of the Attic Angel Class of 1961. She was a volunteer at the Attic Angel Tower and Nursing Home on Segoe Road. She helped to establish the craft program for residents there. Today that program continues to thrive from its home base in the Attic Angel Place Studio.

Mike and Winona were longtime Attic Angel residents in their retirement years. Together, they experienced the Attic Angel Community from both volunteer and resident perspectives. The Fosters' joint commitment to the mission of Attic Angel Association led them to become members of Attic Angel Legacy by contributing to the Haven building campaign. A few years ago, Dr. Foster again gave a major gift, this time for the new rehab dining room in the Attic Angel Place Expansion. Mike and Winona were also longtime Mahoney Society members, having declared their intention to include Attic Angel Association in their estate plans.

Special permanent recognition will be given to the recent Foster estate gifts at some time in the future. For the present time, the two unrestricted gifts reside within a named fund where they can be tracked and stewarded by the Association Board. Unrestricted legacy gifts such as these are transformational for Attic Angel Association. They strengthen the organization's foundation and ensure its future health. While safely invested, the gifts grow, inspire and open up new possibilities as Association leaders chart a future course and determine how the gifts can best fulfill the Association's mission.

Throughout the Association's history, the farsighted vision and generosity of donors such as the Fosters has enabled Attic Angel Association to remain a strong and vital force for good within Dane County. It is humbling indeed for this volunteer organization to be regarded so highly by the Fosters and to be a recipient of their legacy giving.



New Neighbors

Recently, Gallina Companies shared the drawings for a proposed apartment building on the corner of Elderberry Road and Pleasant View Road at a couple of meetings. They are planning to build on the land which they are in the process of purchasing from Attic Angel Prairie Point. The proposed project will be called the Tuscany, and will consist of 174 apartments in two u-shaped buildings of three and four stories connected by a two story building which will house the clubhouse. There is an Italian theme in the selection of exterior finishes and roofing colors.

There are a number of amenities available to their renters that will also be available to the Prairie Point residents (for a fee). They include: outdoor swimming pool, picnic / grill area, fire pit, Community Room, exercise room, and a clubhouse. The plan is to obtain final city approvals for the Tuscany by July, with construction starting in October and completed in September 2015.
